Young People Empowering Communities to Make a Difference During Emergencies



First Responders Award Win, Sported Awards, Tower Hamlets, London 11 June 2025

The First Responders project, a groundbreaking and now *award winning* project that highlights the importance of community unity during emergencies. The initiative aims to empower individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary to take immediate action before paramedics arrive, emphasising the significant impact collective responsibility can have in times of crisis.

The project, a collaboration between Mile End Community Project, Osmani Trust/THICN, Perspective Pictures, London Training Centre, and Genesis Cinema has won the prestigious "Contribution to Enhance Community Safety Award" at the inaugural Sported Awards, recognising the amazing work celebrating the difference being made in communities across the UK.

By working together and exploring various methods to connect with the community, First Responders recognises the necessity of raising awareness and actively involving community members in potentially lifesaving scenarios.

The project included a bus stop advertising campaign, significant online social media presence, an innovative 6 month pre-feature film trailer campaign and prominent space across mainstream and ethnic media television stations, reaching young people, families and the wider community with over 200,000 reached.

First Responders seeks to address community needs by promoting diverse perspectives and innovative strategies including the transliteration of the project and it's video into Sylheti and Somali ensuring that language is no barrier to communities deemed *"Hard to Reach"*.

The project funded by London's Violence Reduction Unit and the Sadiq Khan's flagship MyEnds Programme highlights the value of collective efforts in achieving positive outcomes and emphasises the importance of informing the community about the significance of collaboration and exploring different approaches.

The next stage of First Responders will focus on training more young individuals to attend first aid courses. Additionally, the project aims to develop a user-friendly website and app that will serve as valuable tools for community members to access information and resources related to the campaign as part of the next phase of the project.

In summary, the First Responders project encompasses publicity, campaign activities, screenings, resource development, and the crucial goal of equipping the community with lifesaving skills. By tackling pressing issues such as violent crime, drug abuse, and dangerous driving, and by training young individuals in first aid, the initiative strives to make a positive impact on the well-being and safety of the community.

- First Responders is a Mile End Community Project Initiative supported by Osmani Trust, Perspective Pictures, London Training Centre, Genesis, VRU (Violent Reduction Unit), and THICN (Tower Hamlets Island Community Netowkr).
